


International students in the UK: surviving a hostile environment?

Students from outside the EU have driven the recent growth in international students


Overseas students at UK universities, all modes and levels, millions






Considerable variation across the sector in numbers of international students









And proportion






Tuition fee differential

A hostile policy environment

- Since 2011, with the election of the Coalition Government (Conservative + Liberal Democrat – centrist)
- Increase in far-right political parties
- Brexit exemplified fears about immigration
- Refugees, EU integration, & labour migration became conflated in public discourse





Students = migrants


- Targets for 'net migration' to be at 0% have included international students
- Contradicts calculations performed by many other host countries
- Historically, there has been a methodological question about the use of a survey (rather than digital exit data) suggesting potential for overestimation of long-term stays after study
- Decision is a ultimately a political stance



International Education Strategy (2019)

- Increase the value of education exports to £35 billion per year by 2030
- Increase the total number of international students choosing to study in the UK higher education system each year to 600,000 by 2030





Rhetoric around international students as:

- Risks to 'quality' of higher education
- Likely to violate the terms of their visas

"The (previous) home secretary, <u>James Cleverly</u>, has said international students may be "undermining the integrity and quality of the UK higher education system" by using university courses as a cheap way of getting work visas." (2024)



Frequent policy changes create instability & lack of trust

- Post-study work visas:
 - Created 2008 2 years post graduation
 - Removed 2012
 - Reinstated 2021 Graduate Visa 'subject to review'
- NHS surcharge
- Right to join with dependants removed in 2024 (Sunak)
- Latest move to restrict visa applications for work AND study from 'countries most likely to apply for asylum' (Nigeria, Pakistan, etc)

Rise of the university fat cats: Vice chancellors enjoy £80,000 boost to their pay packets despite student funding crisis

Data from the Higher education Statistics Authority revealed that while university chiefs on average received a five percent pay rise last year, some increased by up to



The human consequences

- 'Conditional status' Hutcheson, 2025 (forthcoming)
- Anxiety & fear
- Political legitimatization of latent racism that condones overt racism (e.g. Mittelmeier & Cockayne 2023)
- Constraints placed on the educational potential of international higher education – the transformative space for relational engagement is compromised by fear and hostility



Conclusion

- In the UK, limited mainstream political will to oppose hostile migration regimes
- Politicians defend international students by conceptualising international higher education as an industry
- University groups adopt similar rhetoric
- Defence of the educational, relational dimension & of international students' rights lacks mainstream traction
